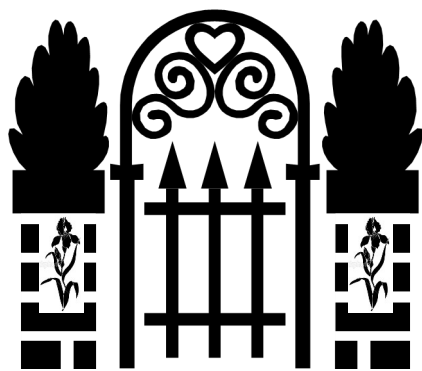

Report from August Auction & Meeting



We ❤️ Irises

TAIS President Kevin Kartchner called our August 8 meeting to order at the Tucson Botanical Gardens.

Trek: Pat Olsen reported on the TAIS-sponsored Trek to be held on October 17 at Tohoho Chul Park. Past AIS President Jody Nolin will be our honored speaker on the subject of 'The Wide World of Iris.' Pat encouraged all members to register (forms on our website) and to RSVP for the Swiss Raclette on Saturday evening, generously hosted by members Jody and John Williams. A Swiss Raclette is not a formal dinner, but rather a chance to share stories while enjoying melted raclette cheese served on meats, potatoes and other Alpine favorites.

Goody bags are stuffed, silent auction treasures itemized, and more raffle baskets than we can count are all organized. The Trek price is only \$60 which includes free admission to the park, a \$32 luncheon, and priceless friendships to be formed.

Sale: We were reminded that the September 19 iris sale will be held at Harlow's Gardens at 9:00. Members are encouraged to assist in setting up and to bring donated, very clean and labeled golf-ball-sized rhizomes on Friday at 3:00. Your reward is an early shopping event **after** set up. Donated rhizomes are

eligible for \$2 Iris Bucks and potted iris \$4. On Saturday, members may shop from 8:00-9:00, after which time the public is invited in, and all volunteers will be available to answer questions. The sale is over when we sell out of iris, or 1:00. Pat Olsen will be holding a potting demonstration at 9:30 and 10:15, with each participant's purchased rhizome. Dan Schroeder will be Pat's assistant. The public's price will be \$10 per rhizome, including potted and/or 'landscape' iris. The special will be buy 6, receive 1 rhizome free. (limit 3 specials per person.) Club members who volunteer on Friday or shop at Harlow's between 8-9:00 on Saturday may purchase rhizomes at \$9 each, and 1 free after purchasing 6. (limit 3 per transaction). Please volunteer to support this sale by emailing or texting Pat, our chairperson.

A motion was moved, seconded and approved that anyone joining the club at the sale will have their membership extended through 2027. Forms will be available at the Landscape Iris table and the membership table. We want our new members to attend meetings and current members to share their experiences,

showing support for our club.

Sam: A motion was moved, seconded and approved to donate a memorial of \$100 in honor of Sam Wymer, a lifetime member of TAIS, to the AIS Youth Fund. Sam was particularly fond of children and teens.

Nominations: Bonnie Else reported for the Nomination Committee. There were no further nominations from the floor, so she presented the following slate: President, Cindy Long; Vice President, Pat Olsen; Secretary, Linda Briggs; and Treasurer, Joyce Knill. A motion was moved to accept the slate, seconded and approved. Per our club by-laws, the new board will assume their new offices in November, to be held for 1 year, at which time a new election will be held. As past President, Kevin Kartchner will assume a director's position.

Potluck: Set your calendar for the November 14 potluck with seed- and plant swap. Bonnie is researching an accommodating location, so info will follow.

Auction: The auction featured 34 large iris rhizomes from Mid-America and 16 of these were 2026 introductions, priced at \$75 in their current catalog. Fifteen members attended, 10 were bidders and Pat won 'Make up Artist' for only \$42 (high price of the afternoon). Cathy won (truly won!) 'Eternal Dawn' for only \$15. Kevin Kartchner was our auctioneer and was very persistent in encouraging all to bid. Our club raised \$656 and \$273 Iris Bucks were used.

The meeting then adjourned after snacking on cookies and quenching our thirst, thanks to the Refreshment Team.

Tips for Heat-Proofing Your Garden, Part I

The AZ Plant Lady, Noelle Johnson, offers these tips.

1. **Create Shade.** Use small trees such as desert willow or Texas Olive, shrubs such as hopbush or Orange Bells 'Jubilee' (or other *Tecoma*), or use shade cloth.
2. **Reduce Reflected Heat** from walls, house, rocks, driveway, and sidewalks. Plant tall shrubs (5-6' tall and wide) along walls and prune them once a year or less. Cover areas of ground surface with plants. It is OK if they touch one another. Mulch, water deeply.
3. **Use Heat-Proof plants.** Some good choices include:
 - 'Outback Sunrise' Emu - evergreen, 1' tall and 3-6' wide, fine with reflected heat, prune once a year
 - 'Bells of Fire' *Tecoma* - 4-5' tall and wide, full or filtered sun, fine with reflected heat, hummingbird magnet
 - Queen's Wreath vine - 5-15' tall by 10' wide, needs a trellis, full or filtered sun, pink flowers, cold sensitive
 - Pink Muhley Grass - 3' tall and wide, full or filtered sun, flowers in fall
 - Firesticks - 3-8' tall by 3-6' wide, stay somewhat smaller in pots, full or filtered sun, avoid the milky sap

One plant that struggles in our increasingly hot summers and that she no longer grows is purple trailing lantana. It had been a favorite. And she now plants blue elf aloe in shade rather than sun. - SC

The year the iris was introduced and the hybridizer (developer).

The registered or published height in inches.

BLOOM TIME

When it normally blooms in relation to others in its class.

VE Very Early

EML Early-Mid-Late

M Midseason

L Late

Rhizome Sale Update by Pat Olsen

Harlow Gardens, Saturday, September 19, 2026,
9:00 a.m.–12:00 p.m.

TAIS Member Sale: 8:00–9:00 a.m.

Our **Annual Rhizome Sale** is just around the corner—less than three weeks away! We've already received the packing list from one supplier, and we're looking forward to seeing what arrives from our other supplier and from our members.

Member donations are an important part of our sale. If you have increases from named varieties growing in your garden, please consider donating some of your extra rhizomes. It's a great way to support TAIS while making even more varieties available to our customers.

Donating Rhizomes

Please do not dig rhizomes more than seven days before the sale. Since our sale is **Saturday, September 19**, the earliest digging date is **Saturday, September 12**.

To prepare your rhizomes for donation:

- Using a **black Sharpie**, clearly write the variety name on the center leaf of the fan.
- Trim the fans and, if needed, trim back excessively long roots.
- Wash off all soil.
- Allow the rhizomes to dry before bringing them to the sale.

If you plan to donate, please email cpicrat@gmail.com **no later than Wednesday, September 16**, with the names of the varieties you will be bringing. Knowing what is coming ahead of time helps us prepare for the sale.

For **Tall Bearded (TB)** irises, donated rhizomes should be at least **golf-ball size**. A rhizome this size is considered viable for our Tucson growing conditions; smaller rhizomes are considered too small for the sale.

Donations may be brought to the sale location on **Friday, September 18, beginning at 3:00 p.m.** Kevin will be at the receiving table to accept donations and issue **Iris Bucks** for named irises.

Please remember: **NOIDs (No Identification) do not receive Iris Bucks**, whether donated bare root or potted.

Volunteers Needed

A couple of extra volunteers would help lighten the workload for everyone. If you can spare even a couple of hours, we would appreciate the extra help.

Friday Set-Up

We can begin setting up for the sale on **Friday, September 18, at 2:30 p.m.** Member rhizome donations may be brought in beginning at **3:00 p.m.** We need to have everything completed and be out by **4:30 p.m.**

- **2:30 p.m.** — Set-up begins
- **3:00 p.m.** — Member donations accepted
- **4:30 p.m.** — Set-up complete

Saturday — Sale Day

All volunteers working the sale on **Saturday** are encouraged to wear their new **TAIS club shirts**. Having our volunteers in matching shirts will make TAIS members easy for customers to identify when they have questions or need help selecting or growing their irises.

We could especially use **additional tally writers and another volunteer at the membership table**. Even a couple of hours would help lighten the workload for everyone.

Plant rhizomes starting this month through October. Aim for at least six weeks before frost. Soak rhizomes for 30 min in water to rehydrate them. Sterilize new rhizomes for about 10 minutes in a solution of 2 1/4 c water and 1/4 c bleach (9:1 ratio). There are two strategies for dried roots - keep them to stabilize the rhizome or remove them to allow the rhizome to contact the soil. For planting in the garden: Choose a spot that will receive afternoon shade during the summer. Good drainage is essential, as is good air circulation! Consider that block walls reflect and radiate lots of heat, which can be harmful. Dig a hole with enough depth so that the surface of the rhizome will be buried about 1/2" to prevent rot caused by sun damage. Alternatively, some people prefer to leave the surface of the rhizome exposed. I like to stir a tablespoonful of fertilizer (from [Schreiner's](#) or [Comanche Acres](#)) into the bottom of the hole. Create a mound of soil in the center of the hole and fan any remaining roots over it. Press soil firmly over rhizome to remove any air pockets. Drip lines appear to be the best way to water irises in the desert. Emitters with adjustable flow will give you the most control. I use Raindrip Adjustable Full Circle Stream Bubblers. - SC

Tip Exchange

"One of the best ways to gauge heat tolerance is to see which plants still look great at the end of summer. September reveals more about a plant's heat resistance than spring ever can. Watch your neighborhood and make note of the plants thriving after months of intense heat—that knowledge is priceless when planning your garden."

Did You Know?

Some ways to help plants through the heat include: 1) Poke a finger into the soil - if dry 1" down [6" for iris], water deeply in the morning. 2) Mulch with compost, leaves, pine needles, or grass clippings to reduce evaporation and keep soil cooler. [No mulch near iris crowns, though!] 3) Do not fertilize in hot weather, as new growth requires even more water. 4) Shade plants with shade cloth or even old bed sheets. 5) Harvest produce, such as tomatoes, sooner rather than later. - SC

A Little Bit of Botany and Iris History

Tell Muhlestein (1913-1978) is another hybridizer of note. Tell lived in Provo and later Orem, Utah and introduced 214 irises, mostly tall bearded. He operated Tell's Iris Gardens in Provo and put out combination [iris catalog and hybridizer's handbooks](#) with the same name. These contained pedigrees for many of the irises, helpful hints, as well as cartoon characters called "Squiggles" by Twyla Olmstead. Cooley's Iris Gardens handled Tell's later introductions.

Like many iris hybridizers, Tell was a man of many talents and interests. He began raising German roller canaries at age ten, and as an adult was a world-renowned breeder and judge. These birds, also known as Harz Roller and German Whistler, are prized for their song, which is produced while their beaks are closed. He also bred Pomeranian dogs. Tell was an accomplished pianist and composer, acted in many plays at BYU and other places, arranged flowers, drove a school bus for years, and was active in his church. He served as president of AIS and was an iris judge. And managed to hybridize all of those irises in the meantime! An interesting story survives that during his first attempt at crossing irises, Tell put the pollen on the flower's beard rather than on the stigmatic lip where it should go. He soon figured it out, obviously, and later mentored several younger hybridizers.

Tell's '[Swan Ballet](#)' (1953) (photo above) won the 1959 Dykes Medal and his IB '[Lemon Flurry](#)' (1965) won the Sass Medal in 1973, the highest medal for Intermediate bearded irises. - SC
